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Monitoring behaviour of bush pigs in the Garden Route

In our February newsletter last year, PMSA zoomed in to proposed research on bush pigs in protected buffer zones in the Garden Route. This came about when PMSA alerted SANParks in 2020 about bush pigs damaging neighbouring private landowners' maize crops in the Knysna area. SANParks approached researchers at the George campus of the Nelson Mandela Bay University (NMU) to set up a joint research project to observe bush pig behaviour and find potential solutions to reduce damage. This is a major step to better understand the drivers of bush pig landscape use and behaviour, which will be important for trying alternative approaches to reduce their impact.

According to Lizette Moolman, scientist Wildlife Ecology at the Garden Route National Park, the NMU group started analysing images from the cameras in the Lancewood area. However, they could not pick up any kind of patterns due to too few cameras. SANParks is planning to set up 15 cameras of their own to do a more targeted and intense survey.

She undertook to provide PMSA with a short report and photos as the data is being assessed and analysed. The knowledge gained will help to make informed decisions regarding bushpig magament as well as highlight information gaps that need to be addressed.



Managing predation by leopard – preventive strategies





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The Predation Management Centre (PMC) provides information leaflets on leopards, which they source from research conducted on the reproduction of the predator species. The next leaflet in this series describes some of the most common methods to prevent predation on livestock.

Traditional livestock management strategies are fairly effective in protecting livestock from leopards. However, a combination of methods or different combinations during different times of the year often yield the best results. The choice of methods will depend on terrain, prevailing environmental conditions, and the cost of the methods, among others.

The social organisation of leopards underlines the importance of careful management of leopards in an area. They are organised in a tight mosaic of home ranges that do not overlap much with neighbouring home ranges, with little tolerance for other leopards of the same sex. Therefore, and because of the fact that leopards also prey on smaller predators, prevention is important in managing livestock predation by leopard in an area.
